The evidence-based paper will assist you in synthesizing major		
concepts from this class. Students should select a clinical question		
and use evidence-based literature to answer the clinical question.		
Major headings should include an overview of the clinical question,		
methods used to search the literature, synthesis of the results,		
discussion of findings in relation to the clinical population,		
suggestions for future research, evidence to policy makers (white		
paper), and other headings as needed. The white paper section		
should include a short summary of the clinical problem, previous		
options identified, and new solutions to the problem. Part of this		
paper includes a literature matrix consisting of the empirical		
evidence used to write the paper. The matrix should be prepared in a		
table format and included as an appendix. The body of the paper		
should be between 12-15 pages.
