Evaluation Methods

1). Class Participation – 15 % of the course grade

Active participation in <u>online class discussions</u>, team <u>presentations</u>, and <u>on line postings</u> <u>of self-reflections</u> are required components for class participation. No participation during a week will result in a grade of "0" for that week.

2) Critical Thinking Exercises (Two) – 60 % of the course grade

Two critical thinking exercises will comprise 60% of the course grade. Each critical thinking exercise will comprise 30 % of the course exercise.

3). Utilizing Theory in Program Development Paper – 15 % of the course grade

In the Utilizing Theory in Program Development Paper the student will propose the development of a program intended to alter lifestyle behavior(s) of patients using a selected theory. In addition to the Title page, the abstract, and the list of references, the body of the paper should be between 8-10 pages. The paper should have the following major subheadings or sections that should be explicitly used in the paper (it is fine to modify the wording of the heading so that it corresponds with your topic). NOTE: Proper mechanics of writing are an expectation. Points will be deducted for grammar errors, sentence/paragraph structure errors, APA formatting errors).

- 1. Introduction (5 points)
- 2. Overview of the Program (20 points)
- 3. Overview of the Theory (20 points)
- 4. Use of the Theory to Guide Program Development (50 points)
- 5. Conclusion (5 points)

4). Written Peer Critique of Program Development Paper – 10 % of course grade

Near the end of the semester, students will receive a copy of a classmate's Utilizing Theory for Program Development paper. A peers paper will be assigned. The components of the peer critique will include the following elements.

- 1. An overall evaluation of the "goodness of fit" of the selected theory for the planned program.
- 2. Quality of the proposed program,
- 3. Use of the theory to guide the program,
- 4. Mechanics of writing (sentence/paragraph structure, correct grammar, spelling, and APA formatting).

The critique should be no more than 2 pages in length.

NOTE: The course faculty assigns the grade for the Utilizing Theory Program Development Paper.

The person completing the critique earns the grade for the Peer Critique of Program Development Paper and is not assigning a grade to the person whose paper is reviewed and critiqued.

Prior to mid-semester, you will receive feedback on your academic performance in this course. Dr. Sapp is available to discuss academic performance by appointment.
